Ethos and Principles

The u3a movement began in 1981 and has remained a non-religious and non-political group with three main types of principle:



| Life long Learning | Membership of a u3a is open to all people who have retired from full time work. |
|--------------------------|--|
| and | Members promote the values of lifelong learning the positive attributes of belonging to a u3a. |
| Self Help | Members form interest groups covering as wide a range of topics and activities as they desire; by members, for members. |
| | No qualifications are sought or offered. Learning is for its own sake, with enjoyment being the prime motive, not qualifications or rewards. |
| | There is no distinction between the learners and the teachers; they are all u3a members. |
| The Mutual Aid Principle | Each u3a is a mutual aid organisation, operationally independent but a member of The Third Age Trust, which requires adherence to the guiding principles of the u3a movement. |
| | No payments are made to members for services rendered to any u3a. |
| | Each u3a is self-funded with membership. |
