Welcome to the October/November edition of the Lostwithiel Area u3a Newsletter. In this issue there's news of our next few Open Meetings, a report from three garden visits and a face-off between a muddy puddle and a road. SEPTEMBER OPEN MEETING

At our last Open Meeting in the Church Rooms on **Monday 9th September** we opened with **Tracey Bailey** from **Kana Lostwithiel Community Choir** (formerly Lost in Song) in our Community Slot. Tracey soon got us all singing a round - which certainly helped to blow away the cobwebs! - and explained how the group contributes both to community cohesion and wellbeing. The group welcomes new singers of all ages and abilities and meets every Wednesday at 7pm in the Scout Hut in Lostwithiel.

We then heard from **Mike Griffiths** with his talk *Listening to the Enemy*, featuring the fascinating story of the Bletchley Park outstation in St Erth. Over several years, Mike has painstakingly researched the origins and purpose of this site. His father, Harry, was a radio operator at the station throughout the war and recorded many of his contacts in a little black book – his 'Code Book'. Mike talked us through how his father could identify German radio operators through their unique "fingerprint" and how messages were deciphered at Bletchley Park - and we were able to hear an actual morse code message from an enemy operative. Recounting the pivotal role played by code breakers and mathematicians like Alan Turing, W.T. (Bill) Tutte and Gordon Welchman, Mike also told the stories of double agents such as Agent Zigzag (Eddie Chapman) and the workings of the Double-Cross (XX) system.

It was enlightening hearing how Mike's father played such an important role at St Erth and it was brilliant that one of our members, **John Overy**, came along to the meeting with a Bletchley Park medal awarded to his relative Mrs Louisa Joan Alexander. Louisa Joan was selected for Bletchley Park at age 18, probably because she had done well at school, and was there from 1942, working a 14 hour day, 7 days a week, with just one visit home in all that time. Her parents never knew where she was or what she was doing. Bletchley Park commemorative medals were only given to people like her years later when Bletchley Park was no longer secret.

Louisa Joan will be 100 on 7 October 2024 and John, as her next of kin, has been busy organising the big day in Kent. Members of Parliament, the Government, GCHQ and senior members of the intelligence services have met and spoken with her in recent years. Many thanks to Mike and John for sharing the vital contributions their relatives made during the Second World War.

UPCOMING OPEN MEETINGS

Our next, highly topical, Open Meeting is on **Monday November 4th at 2pm** when our Guest Speaker - and local resident - **Robin Dyer**, will be talking to us about **The historic US Election of 2024 - the fight for America's democracy and its soul** - just 24 hours before the US Presidential Election is held! The venue, as usual, is the Church Rooms in Lostwithiel.

And for our first Open Meeting of 2025 on **Monday 6th January** our guest speaker is Lynn Gould who will be talking to us about *Daphne du Maurier's Cornwall*, while on **Monday 3rd March** we'll be hearing from **Brian Oldham** about *Trades and Occupations in 19th Century Liskeard*. Our Speaker Secretary, Karen Dickin, is now working on finding further guest speakers for next year and as soon as they are confirmed you will read it here first!

Garden Visits

In August the group visited **Lametton Mill** at St Keyne (as featured on Channel 4's *Grand Designs*) where fifteen of us enjoyed a sunny-ish visit. We had a very interesting talk about the history of the house by the owners, Richard and Leigh, including the background to massive revamp shown on the programme. We were then shown around the garden and were so impressed by what they have done in a very short time. Lots of unusual plants - and looking very mature despite the first planting being done in 2021 and some areas not planted until last year. We were able to look around their propagating area and there were great plants for sale. Finally we enjoyed tea/ coffee and a choice of scrummy cakes before heading home.

In September it was a shame that just four members went on a very enjoyable and sunny day out to St Columb. **Lower Tregamere** was open for the National Garden Scheme in the afternoon so we were delighted when the owners of nearby **Rose Morran** agreed to open their garden for us in the morning. Peter and Jenny were very generous with their time and gave us a guided tour of the garden which they have been developing over the last ten years. The property and garden occupy a one-acre plot and the borders are full of shrubs and plants which provide texture and all year round colour. We also admired the trees such as the Chilean myrtles

and several varieties of acers as well as prunus full of white or pink berries which looked so pretty against the clear blue sky. We then moved to the one-acre grass area surrounded by edges where shrubs such as the Mexican shrimp plant thrive. Peter and Jenny also have raised beds and a greenhouse where they propagate plants to sell for the NGS as well for Pencarrow House.

We had our picnic lunch in their garden, indulged in tea and cakes and bought several plants before making our way to the next garden, Lower Tregamere, which was a total contrast! It can be described as a natural, even wild garden, divided into three sections and with intriguing features at every corner. Much of the garden was put in place by the globetrotting Blakes who built the house as a summer residence in the early 1920s. W.T. Blake led the first attempt to fly around the world in 1922. The current owners acquired the property more than twenty years ago, starting work on the garden ten years ago and continue to develop it to turn it into "their own paradise". The less common trees we saw were: Bamboo, Banana, Chilean fire bush, Ginko, Gunnera, Handkerchief tree, Katsuras, Korean and Norwegian Firs, Redwoods, Tassel bush, Tulip tree and Whitebeam. Intriguing features included a Chinese Gate, a doll house Swiss Chalet, Dan's seat, an owl sculpture and a chess board. It will be interesting to go back in a few years' time as the owners are planning many further improvements.

The Sauvignon Blanc was perfect for a barbie, light and refreshing. Some preferred the French Chenin Blanc for its aromatic taste.
